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Executive Summary

As our members will be aware, in the academic year 2017/18 we developed a brand new membership scheme, based on institutional turnover. We did so based on consultation with our members. You told us that membership rates were higher than comparable membership bodies operating in Higher Education. We took on your views and responded accordingly.

We also developed a Beyond London membership campaign. In less than a year, we were joined by: University of Kent, Liverpool John Moores University and Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. This is a timely shift, coinciding with rapid funding diversification to the regions, largely in response to the Industrial Strategy. We anticipate that opportunities for more dispersed networks will continue to present themselves in response to new policy directives.

We are really pleased to have worked with so many wonderful colleagues over the last academic year. We value and welcome your feedback. It has been heartening to see such strong interest in our new bid swarms and fora in particular. This short report highlights the key activities we have undertaken over the year. It also highlights how we can work with you on a more bespoke basis, should you so desire. We look forward to working with you in future and would like to take this opportunity to thank you so much for your ongoing commitment, support and responsiveness.

Funding Swarms And Applications

In the last year TCCE has brought members together for initial round-tables and subsequent development of both large and smaller-scale funding applications.

Involving partners from our wider networks in the cultural and creative industries, as well as non TCCE academic members where appropriate, we have been pleased to support applications to large-scale schemes led by AHRC, HEFCE and ESRC. In the last 12 months we have initiated and supported the following applications:

Connecting Capability Fund

TCCE worked with two separate member led consortia. One bid led by City University of London, focussed on engaging emerging technologies within the creative industry SME Sector. Other TCCE members, including Ravensbourne University London were also involved in that bid. A second bid, led by Middlesex University, aimed to create a diverse network which also aimed to use technologies to enable diverse creative businesses to secure their IP and develop new routes to market.

AHRC Creative Economy Programme

TCCE held a bid swarm which resulted in at least two submissions to EOI stage, one co-developed by City and TCCE with other partners including: Manchester Metropolitan, The British Library, Knowledge Quarter, the V&A, the Design Council and Golant Media Ventures. Another bid, again with a very significant range of stakeholders and partners and led by colleagues at LSBU and Ravensbourne University London were invited to submit to full application stage.

ESRC Cross-disciplinary Mental Health Network Plus

Colleagues from Middlesex University and other TCCE members of the newly formed TCCE Arts and Health Forum, worked together to develop a proposal to this fund. The Eco-Arts Network bid was proposed as means of combining ecological, co-creative, and arts-based methods to develop innovative approaches to young people's mental health.

TCCE Researcher-Led Fora

Following our Sounding Board meeting in Somerset House last June, several members expressed interest in working more closely and purposefully together on big themes of common interest and concern.

As a result of this decision, we have launched three new fora in the current academic year with plans for further developments in the coming academic year.

Arts And Health Forum

In November 2017, TCCE members University of West London and City, University of London were instrumental in bringing the inaugural TCCE Arts and Health forum to fruition with presentations by Prof Victoria Tischler (Professor of Arts and Health and Head of Dementia Care, University of West London) and Dr Patricia Moran (Head of English Dept, City, UoL). The intention is that, over time, the TCCE Arts and Health Forum will become a member managed initiative, acting as a mini-hub within the network, bringing researchers together to discuss and showcase work, meet with professionals in the fields of Arts and Health and horizon scan for funding bids and other such opportunities. Representatives for across TCCE's member institutions attended the launch and several were subsequently involved in the above-cited ESRC Cross-disciplinary Mental Health Plus Network bid.

Arts and Digital Creativity Forum

The TCCE Arts and Digital Creativity Forum had it's initial meeting in May 2018. Convened by Liverpool John Moores University and hosted by Ravensbourne University London the first meeting was well attended by a group of researchers from across many different disciplines. Dr Pauline Brookes, from LIMU and Dr Nick Lambert from Ravensbourne gave opening provocations, and a fascinating range of research interests were shared, with many areas of mutual interest revealed. Researchers from LIMU, Ravensbourne and University of Kent have formed a Steering Group to take the group forward. Meetings will be opened to invited artists and creative industries professionals.



Creative Entrepreneurship Forum

Creative Entrepreneurship has been highlighted as an issue of common interest across the majority of TCCE members, and the first meeting of the forum, hosted and chaired by Professor Helena Gaunt, Guildhall School of Music and Drama was well attended. Opening provocations from Professor Gaunt and Dr Neelam Raina, Middlesex University and GCRF Challenge Leader Security Protracted Conflict, Refugee Crises and Forced Displacement: typified the breadth of approaches, disciplines and methodologies used to approach the topic throughout the membership. This provides a set of very rich possibilities for collaboration between TCCE members. In 2018/19 the group will be steered by representatives from Middlesex University and London Southbank University.

Workshops, Networking Events And Symposia

As ever, much of the activity TCCE produces and curates is designed to bring together the arts and academia. Creating opportunities for discussion and potential collaboration is part of our DNA and we feel that such work is increasingly important. This year has been no exception and has seen us bring together diverse groups to explore very timely and challenging issues such as technology and ethics, identity and climate change.

Technology, Ethics and the Arts Now Workshop

As part of the <u>Intersections Festival</u>, hosted by MAT at Queen Mary, University of London, TCCE hosted a workshop addressing timely, challenging and complex questions around how the arts are currently using digital technologies and the wider political, social, ethical and economic contexts in which such uses are unfolding. The workshop created a space for artists and others working in cultural institutions to come together with researchers to engage in peer-topeer sharing, networking and learning. The workshop, devised by Evelyn Wilson, used the following themes to kickstart discussions:

- Creativity, automation and the arts
- Art, technology and mobility
- Immersion: its promises and troubles
- Data Anxiety and technology
- Technology and the communal experience

Guest presenters included Professor John Sloboda (Guildhall School of Music and Drama) and Ruth Catlow (Furtherfield).

Networking Event at the Design Museum

TCCE and the Design Museum were delighted to invite members to a research focussed round-table networking event to enable TCCE member academics and professional staff to develop research relationships with the museum as it approached the first anniversary of being in its new home in the former Commonwealth Institute in Kensington. While there is a nascent research programme underway at the museum, the museum recognises the potential



to develop more substantive and collaborative projects with the Higher Education sector. It has a longer-term aim that research will underpin programme development across curatorial, learning, public programme, audience development and collections. The purpose of the networking round-table was therefore to hear more from senior staff at the museum about their research ambitions, to share ideas on those and discuss potential research collaborations, partnership models and potential funding streams.

Hackademia 3.0

Hackademia 5x5x5 Culture Hack was designed to create a playful space for TCCE Early Career Researchers as well as Artists and Creative SMEs to:

• Reflect on and learn about

collaboration and its role in both research impact and the development of artistic and research practice

- Gain insight into collaboration methodologies and values
- Create a pop-up resources map of the collaborative activity in the group
- Pitch ideas for collaborative projects or partnerships, small or large
- Meet representatives from funding bodies, expand networks and meet potential mentors and critical friends.

The day as a mix of talks, preparatory workshops and pitches. Throughout the day we were joined by speakers including Professor Robert Hampson (Royal Holloway, University of London), Liz Hill (Arts Professional), Mark Prest (Founding Director - Portraits of Recovery (PORe), Pam Johnson



(Senior Partnerships Officer Arts Council England) and Dr Joanna Dunster (Portfolio Manager: Research Careers and Training, Arts and Humanities Research Council). Representatives from TCCE partner universities also joined us including: Dr Mark Gray (Director of Knowledge Transfer, Middlesex University), Dr Erik Bohemia (Loughborough University London) and Ian Gibbs (Head of Academic Enterprise, City, University of London).

TCCE Summer Symposium: Refresh, Reboot, Retool: new imaginaries for challenging times.

TCCE's summer symposium: Refresh, Reboot, Retool: new imaginaries for challenging times brought together a heady mix of academics, artists, creatives, activists and those engaged in politics. At a point where our futures feel arguably increasingly uncertain and volatile, and where atmospheres of anxiety are pervasive, the symposium was designed to provide a space to take stock and reflect on how we might imagine and indeed create conditions for positive change.

Furthermore it invited us to consider how we might sensitise ourselves to seemingly diffuse and disparate concerns, such as identity and environment. The symposium was chaired by Colin Grant (Author and Historian) with panel contributors including: Alice Black (Director, Design Museum), Ruth Catlow (Co-Director, Furtherfield), Emma Dick (Middlesex University), Kasia Molga (Artist), Professor Toby Miller, (Loughborough University London) Caroline Russell and Paula Graham-Gazzard. Workshops were led by: Duckie, Mark Prest, Curator and Founding Director, Portraits of Recovery and Michaela Jones, Scottish Recovery Consortium, Greenwich Welcomes Action Group (students from Ravensbourne University London), Nick Makoha and Bodhan Piasecki, The BeatFreeks Collective. Author Tony White led a Holborn-based walk based on his new novel *The Fountain in the Forest*, published by Faber and Faber.

Developing Creative Education after Brexit


We were delighted to partner with Council for Higher Education in Art and Design (CHEAD) and the All-Party Parliamentary Design and Innovation Group (APPDIG) on Developing Creative Education after Brexit which was launched at Portcullis House in September 2017. The report was the culmination of a series of consultation round-tables. TCCE presented at and helped to promote the event specifically focussing on Creative Research and Collaboration in June 2017. The report focuses on the follows areas: The Potential of the Creative Industries. International Students, Research and Collaboration, Creative Higher Education Institutions in a Regional Context and The Creative Skills pipeline.

The Exchange: Revealing Collaborative Values

We were delighted to launch our latest TCCE <u>publication</u> after our recent Summer Symposium. The National Network for Academic and Creative Exchange ('The Exchange') was a pilot developed by The Culture Capital Exchange (TCCE) to explore and exchange best practice in effective research collaboration. It was cofunded by HEFCE and Arts Council England. The Exchange brought together the agendas of creative SMEs, artists and HEIs for mutual benefit across a number of areas. The publication features a joint foreword from Dr Steven Hill, Director of Research, Research England and Darren Henley MBE, Chief Executive, Arts Council England. It also includes essays from TCCE directors, Paula Graham-Gazzard (Fossbox and Director, CVAN) and Ashley Jay Brockwell. Its focus is on the practice and policy background of TCCE's wider work, as well as The Exchange project outputs, outcomes and impacts. The publication also features a range of case studies developed as part of the project evaluation.

It is very positive to see the high volume and diversity of beneficiaries The Exchange has directly impacted, and I hope this report will inspire many more collaborations. 77

Collaborations, Consultations And Presentations

In the course of the last year, we have been pleased to work with several external partners on a range of exciting collaborative projects, some of which have been designed to effect change at a senior policy level. This is a snapshot of just some of the types of work with which we have been engaged.

Developing Creative Education after Brexit: A Plan for Economic Growth

This panel style event designed to launch the Developing Creative Education after Brexit report was held to a national audience in Portcullis House, chaired by Barry Sheerman MP: Co-Chair, APDIG and Member of Parliament for Huddersfield. Panellists: The Rt Hon Matt Hancock MP: Minister of State for Digital and Culture, Evelyn Wilson: Director, The Culture Capital Exchange, Professor Anita Taylor: Executive Dean, Bath School of Art & Design, Bath Spa University and Chair of Council for Higher Education in Art and Design, Jack Tindale: Manager, All Party Design and Innovation Group.

Chead conference

TCCE were pleased to attend the CHEAD Membership and Networking event focussing on Knowledge Exchange in June of this year. Speakers included Alex Williams, Kingston University, Professor Bruce Cronin, University of Greenwich, Alex Vincent, AHRC, Dr Graham McLaren, Bath Spa University and Professor Gillian Youngs, Canterbury Christ Church University. TCCE Director Suzie Leighton presented on the work that TCCE and it's members are undertaking to move beyond traditional Knowledge Transfer / Exchange models, to deeper, value based collaborations.

Arts Council / University Alliance seminar

TCCE Director Suzie Leighton was invited to attend a round table consultation called by Darren Henley, CEO of Arts Council England to discuss the introduction of a Professional Doctorate aimed at arts leaders. It was a very interesting discussion, and highlighted some of the professional development requirements of the sector that TCCE and it's membership might be well placed to meet outwith the formal framework of a ProfDoc.



Knowledge Exchange Framework Response

In January TCCE directors worked with key contacts from Ravensbourne University London, City, University of London, Royal Central School of Speech and Drama and Guildhall School of Music and Drama to submit a response to the HEFCE Knowledge Exchange Framework consultation. In our response, we highlighted the scope for greater recognition of how knowledge exploitations and indeed knowledge circulations play out with regard to the cultural and creative industries and the role they play in fomenting relationships beyond and into other sectors, when well aligned with appropriate researcher capability and capacity. We highlighted the

key role that small and specialist institutions who might find it hard to access HEIF funding play in this, making the case for the reintroduction of a minimum HEIF allocation for all HEIs in addition to responding to the technical questions asked by HEFCE. You can see the response in full here.

TCCE E-Newsletter And Social Media

TCCE produces a long-standing and highly regarded enewsletter that acts as vehicle to promote TCCE members activities to TCCE's extensive and ever increasing networks in the arts, cultural and creative sectors. Each month we reach nearly 10.000 subscribers, with an average of 23 events featured per issue. Throughout the course of the year we have issued 11 editorials, featured 108 news items, 229 events and 36 professional opportunities. With nearly 1,700 followers on Twitter, TCCE's online presence acts as another valuable tool to increase our members' outreach and visibility. It is also a valuable vehicle for promoting our larger-scale events such as Hackademia and our Summer Symposium.

@InfoTCCE tweets were seen an average of 4,000 times per month this year, with our profile being visited 300 times.

Other Forms Of Support

As well as our main bid swarms, TCCE directors continue to use our industry and extended national networks to support member institutions and individual member academics in forming collaborations in relation to a wide range of funding bids and other opportunities. Recent examples of this include brokerage around AHRC large grants, AHRC Audiences of the Future and the UKRI Strength in Places Fund.

TCCE directors have also continued to support individuals and institutions in finding academic and industry partners for their conferences, roundtables and public engagement activities.

For example, we are working with LSBU to take forward a new Blockchain Forum for the Arts and Creative Industries. Scheduled to take place in early Autumn 2018, the event will explore blockchain's potential to reimagine and reinvent how the creative industries work across music, fine arts, film, television and games.

We have also worked to bring some of our institutions together with others, in and beyond TCCE, around areas of mutual concern and interest such as opportunities to be part of placemaking strategies. 44 I have a much better understanding of what academic research actually entails and how this can complement, challenge and develop artistically or socially driven creative practices.

TCCE Other Projects

Boosting Resilience

In 2017 together with The Centre for Creativity in Professional Practice at Cass Business School City, University of London and The Centre for Enterprise, Manchester Metropolitan University (CfE/ Manchester Metropolitan University), we were delighted to launch Boosting Resilience: Survival Skills for the New Normal.

Boosting Resilience is one of four new national flagship projects supported by Arts Council England, under their Building Resilience initiative, with the aim of exploring and piloting different approaches to sustainability across its portfolio.

The key goal of the Boosting Resilience: Survival Skills for the New Normal programme is to inspire and support the development of new approaches to making the most of Creative Assets and Intellectual Property in the arts and cultural sector.

The programme, running until 2019, works with a cohort of 26 participants from a diverse range of organisations across England. In its design and strategy, it takes into consideration and builds out from both established and emerging research and sector led thinking on resilience, aiming to create a practical, usercentred programme that also pushes conceptual thinking around creative assets - and indeed creative ecologies more widely - to new limits. We have recently joined forces with Arts Professional to develop and Editorial Partnership that will take the messages of the programme to the wider sector though a series of online articles.
